The purpose of this letter is to provide an update on the status of the findings and corrective actions identified by the U.S. Department of Education's (the Department) Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP) reported in the Differentiated Monitoring and Support (DMS) monitoring report dated June 26, 2020.

This letter responds to the Michigan Department of Education's (MDE) April 5, 2021, September 27, 2021, November 16, 2022, and March 8, 2023, electronic mail correspondence to OSEP to address the corrective actions noted in the June 26, 2020, DMS report. These findings and corrective actions were identified as result of the DMS activities conducted by OSEP during its on-site visit which occurred the week of September 16, 2019.

Based on a review of all the submitted documents, OSEP is closing the remaining findings identified in the June 26, 2020, monitoring report, and no further actions are required at this time. The summary of monitoring priorities and outcomes chart includes the monitoring component, finding, required actions, OSEP analysis, and status of finding(s) based on the evidence received by OSEP to date. Please note that review of the implementation of MDE's corrective actions to determine if they were, in fact, implemented properly may occur during future reviews of your Federal education programs. Also, be aware that failure to implement the corrective actions may result in additional enforcement actions.
